




WALAPAHA TRAIL, SHAWNEE COUNTY





### CORONADO RIDES AGAIN

LATE in the summer of 1541, a generation before white men were seen in Massachusetts, New York or Virginia, Francisco Vasquez de Coronado at the head of thirty picked horsemen, Father Juan de Padilla, a perfidious guide in chains and a half dozen foot soldiers came into what is now Kansas, crossing the Arkansas River near the present site of Dodge City, spent six weeks with Quiviran Indians in the heart of the state, looked over the country and returned to New Spain (Mexico) because he found no gold here. He was the first white man to penetrate any considerable distance into the interior of the United States.






BOAISING TRAIL, NEAR SALINA






