



Kansas has four seasons, and weather varies accordingly—mild spring and Severe winter blizzards are as infrequent as severe wind and rain storms. fall months; warm to hot summer days; and freezing temperatures for a few

Occasionally during the spring there are severe storms with heavy rain and high wind that do move across the Midwest and Southeast. n Kansas, traveler's advisories are issued by the National Weather Service

in cooperation with the Kansas Department of Transportation when weather conditions make travel difficult or hazardous. These 24-hour stations are located at Topeka, Concordia, Colby, Dodge City and Ellsworth (162.4 to and Wichita. All Kansas radio stations broadcast weather forecast information either on AM or FM.

The most severe storms sometimes spawn tornados. The Office of Emergency Preparedness offers the following: Should you be on the highway and sight a tornado, move at right angles to the path of the storm. If this is not possible, seek shelter under a bridge or culvert. If there is no time, lie flat in the roadside ditch or ravine. Do Not Stay In Your Car.

the gas tank at least half full. Tell someone your travel schedule. When a storm gets severe seek shelter. One stalled vehicle can block a highway, and it may not be your car but you will be blocked too! Should you be stalled, stay in your vehicle. Use your winter kit; run motor and 162.55 megacycles FM). The Weather Service also has stations at Kansas City heater sparingly; keep fresh air in the car; exercise arms and legs; check to be sure exhaust pipe is free of snow. Stay awake,
