- Kansas City (C-12)** I-70 westbound at milepost 415
- Goodland (B-2)** I-70 eastbound at milepost 2
- South Haven (G-8)** I-35 Kansas Turnpike northbound at milepost 2
- Capitol-Topeka (C-11)** Located in State Capitol Bldg, 10th & Harrison, 1st Fl.
- Abilene (C-9)** Located in Civic Center Depot, 201 N.W. Second Street
- Coffeyville (G-11)** Located in the Brown Mansion, Walnut & Eldridge Streets
- Hays (C-6)** Located in Visitor Center of Historic Fort Hays, 1472 Hwy 183 Bus. 1-70 Exit 159, 2 miles south on Hwy 183, west on US 183 Bus.
- Concordia (B-8)** Located on U.S. 81 Highway at 8th St.
- Fort Scott (E-12)** Located in the Chamber office/Visitor Center, 231 E. Wall St. Adjacent to Ft. Scott National Historic Site on Hwy 54
- Oswego (F-12)** Located in a MKT Railroad (KATY) caboose
- Intersection of Highways 59 & 96**
- Coffeyville (G-11)** Located in the Brown Mansion, Walnut & Eldridge Streets
- On Hwy 169, one mile north of Oklahoma line**
- Liberal (G-3)** Located in Mary Frame City Park, 229 E. Pancake Blvd.
- On Hwy 54, near intersection with Hwy 83 (pancake-shaped building)**



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SOUTHEAST

CHANUTE (F-11)
Martin & Osa Johnson Safari Museum—1917-36 work of famous wildlife photographers traveling the world.

COFFEYVILLE (G-11)
Dalton Museum—recaptures the Dalton raid on two Coffeyville banks in 1892.



Brown Mansion—1904 mansion with original furnishings & Tiffany glass.

COLUMBUS (F-12)
Clock Tower—only 1919 Seth Thomas Clock Tower in existence, downtown, purchased as a county war memorial.

FREDONIA (F-11)
Stone House Gallery—Built in 1871 of hand-hewn stone, first building in the city, art exhibits.

FORT SCOTT (E-12)
Ft. Scott National Historic Site—1842-53 restored frontier military fort, 33 furnished rooms, living history program.

INDEPENDENCE (F-11)
Riverside Park & Zoo—124 acre park includes "Kiddy Land" and free zoo.

NEODESHA (F-11)
Norman #1 Oil Well & Museum—replica of the first successful oil well west of the Mississippi.

WEST MINERAL (F-12)
Big Brutus Museum—Climb to the top of the 2nd largest coal mining shovel in the world.

SOUTH CENTRAL

ARKANSAS CITY (G-9)
Cherokee Strip Land and Rush Museum—15,000 artifacts of the greatest land rush in America's history.

BELLE PLAINE (F-9)
Barlett Arboretum—30 acres of trees, flowers, shrubs and grasses from all over the world (winter).

CANTON (E-8)
Maxwell Game Preserve—1,000 acres of mid-grass prairie, home for 200 bison and 50 elk; acre fishing lake.

EL DORADO (E-9)
Butler County Oil Museum—Indoor and outdoor exhibits depict the El Dorado field, discovered in 1915.

GOESSEL (E-8)
Mennonite Heritage Museum—three buildings convey the art and spirit of Mennonite life.

GREAT BEND (D-4)
Cheyenne Bottoms Wildlife Management Area—most important wetland area of the Central Flyway; designated a "Wetlands of International Importance".

BRI SPANGH ZOO—50 acre park specializing in North American animals.

GREENSBURG (E-6)
World's Largest Hand-Dag Well—Walk to the bottom of 1885 109 ft. well.

HUTCHINSON (E-8)
Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center—World's largest collection of space suits, complete set of original spacecraft, Omnimax movie theater.

LARNED (E-6)
Ft. Larned National Historic Site—Built in 1859 to protect the Santa Fe Trail, buildings restored to original appearance.

Santa Fe Trail Center—history of the Santa Fe Trail and lifestyles of early day Kansas settlers.

LINDSBORG (D-8)
Bigger Sandzen Memorial Gallery—displays works of internationally praised Swedish-American painter.

Coronado Heights—Coronado once camped here in search of the Seven Cities of Gold.

Old Mill Museum—restored Smoky Valley Roller Mill and Swedish Pavilion; National Historic Register.

LYONS (D-7)
Coronado—Quivira Museum—Artifacts from Coronado's 1541 Kansas trip.

MCPHERSON (D-8)
McPherson Museum—large prehistoric collection of Arkansas Indian pottery, first human-made dish in Kansas.

MEDICINE LODGE (F-7)
Carry Nation Home—home of the stormy temperance leader.

Stockage Museum—replica of frontier stockade, 1874 log cabin.

NEWTON/NORTH NEWTON (E-8)
Warkentin House—national landmark furnished in 19th century decor.

Kauffman Museum—displays culture of the Mennonite immigrants.

NORTHEAST

ABILENE (C-9)
Eisenhower Center—President's boyhood home, museum, library and burial site.

Greyhound Hall of Fame—fastest train, Greyhound's history from 5000 B.C. to the present.

ATCHISON (B-12)
Atchison Museum Depot—filled with Amelia Earhart articles and memorabilia, tourist information.

International Forest of Friendship—trees representing all U.S. states and 37 foreign countries.

BALDWIN CITY (D-12)
Quavie Rare Bible Collection—ancient tables, scrolls, leaves and Bibles.

Old Castle Museum Complex—original home of Baker Univ., Santa Fe Trail Post Office, Kibbe Cabin.

BELLEVILLE (A-8)
Crossroads of Veterans—restored school, church, log cabin, and Rock Island railroad display.

Power Indian Village—Archaeological diggings of actual Indian village, lodge & artifact relics.

BROOKVILLE (D-8)
Brookville Hotel—Historic 1870 hotel & restaurant, famous for family style chicken dinners.

CONCORDIA (B-8)
Brown Grand Theatre—restored 1906 Theatre with original woodwork and furnishings, on National Historic Register.

COUNCIL GROVE (D-10)
Kav Methodist Mission and Museum—first school for Indians.

Hays House Restaurant—begun by Seth Hays, great grandson of Daniel Boone, on National Historic Register.

HANOVER (B-9)
Hollenberg Pony Express Station & Museum—only remaining unaltered station on its original location.

HAWATHA (B-11)
Davis Memorial—11 life size marble statues of Mr. & Mrs. Davis.

HOLTON (B-11)
Hotel Josephine—Rooms open to view the original 1891 interior.

JUNCTION CITY/FORT RILEY (C-9)
Kansas' First Territorial Capital—authentically restored.

U.S. Cavalry Museum—displays the cavalry's role in taming the west.

Milford Conservation Education Center—Aquatic diorama of over 300 models of Kansas aquatic life.

KANSAS CITY (C-12)
The Woodlands—only dual facility horse-dog track in the country.

River City U.S.A.—Riverboat excursions on modern cruiser or paddlewheel boat, floating museum.

Children's Museum—hands-on exhibits to foster creative thinking, imagination and self-confidence.

LAWRENCE (C-12)
K.U. Museum of Natural History—Kansas' largest display of Great Plains fossils & Recent animals, Comanche, Fish Cavalry horse, Spencer Museum of Art—11 galleries, most comprehensive University art gallery in the nation.

LEAVENWORTH/LEAVENWORTH (C-12)
Ft. Leavenworth (1827)—Oldest military installation west of Missouri; original Main Parade area.

Frontier Army Museum—emphasizes the role of the army in the west.

LINCOLN (C-7)
Yoke Museum—Large Victorian Home built in late 1890's; original antique furniture, toys.

LINCOLN COUNTY (C-7)
Noted for miles and miles of post rock fence posts, earning it the name "Post Rock Capital of Kansas".

MANHATTAN (C-10)
Manhattan Prairie Research Natural Area—8,000 acres of tall-grass prairie preserved for ecological study, self-guided nature trail.

OVERLAND PARK (C-12)
NGAA Visitors Center—Spacious photographic and video sales to NCAA competition participants.

SALINA (C-8)
Salina Art Center—Changing exhibitions of visual art and hands-on Discovery area for children.

SHAWNEE (C-12)
Old Shawnee Town—Kansas' first jail, cabin, & original buildings.

Shawnee Methodist Mission—one of the earliest Indian Missions, 2nd territorial capital of Kansas.

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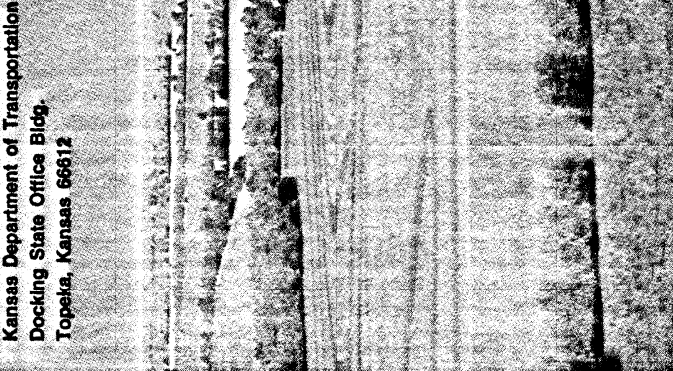
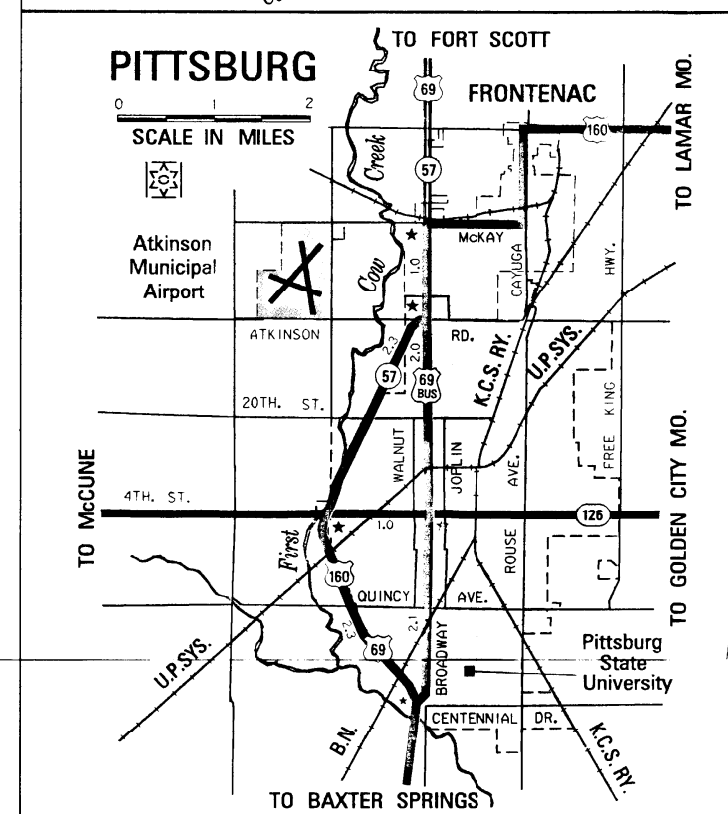
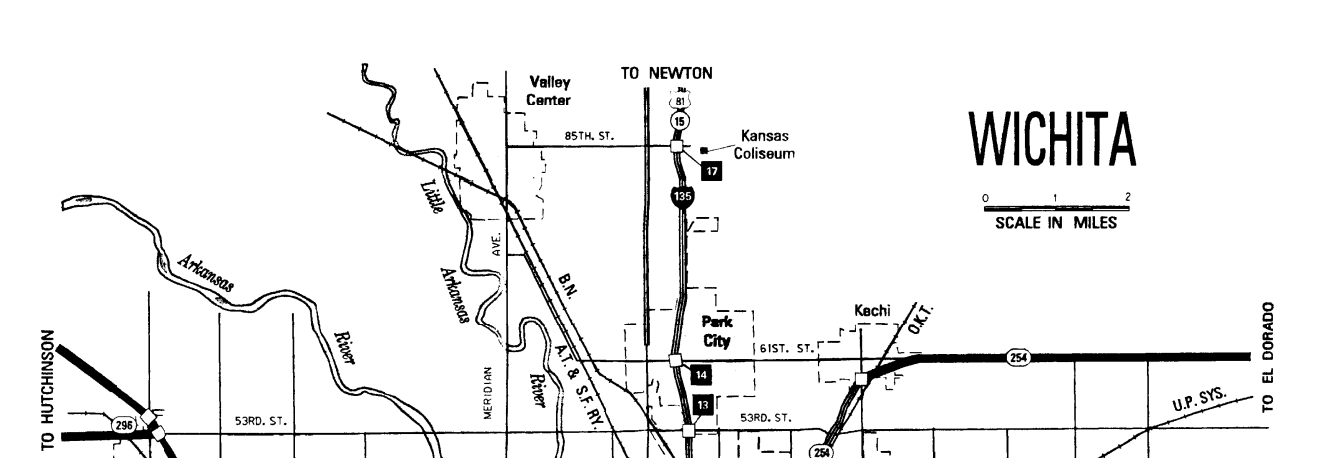
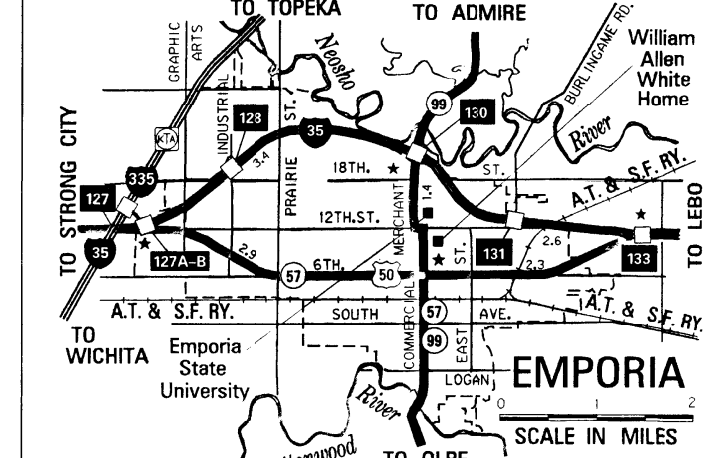
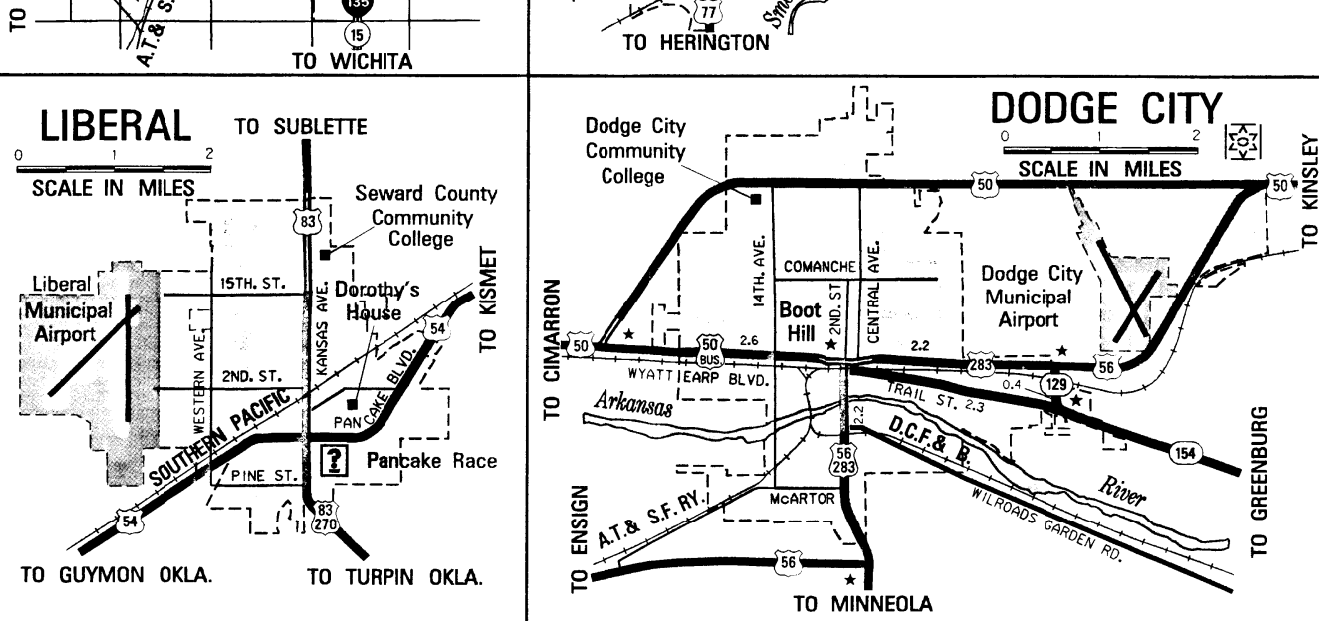
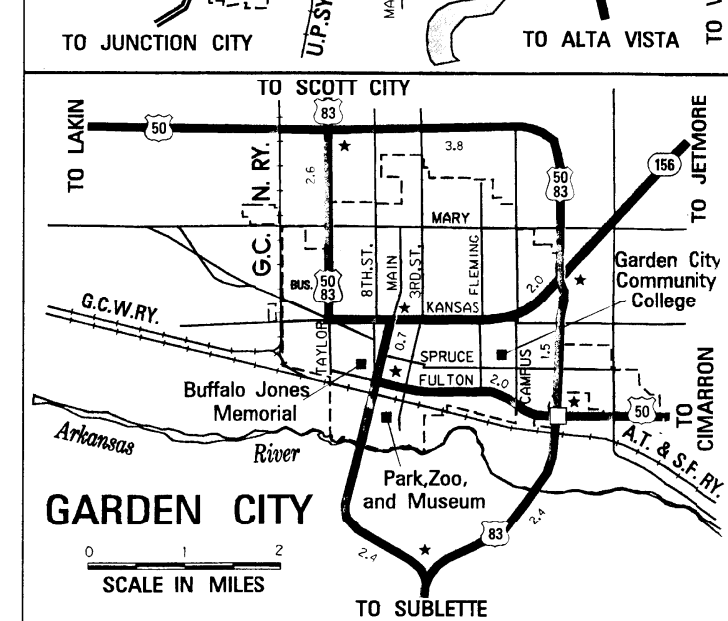
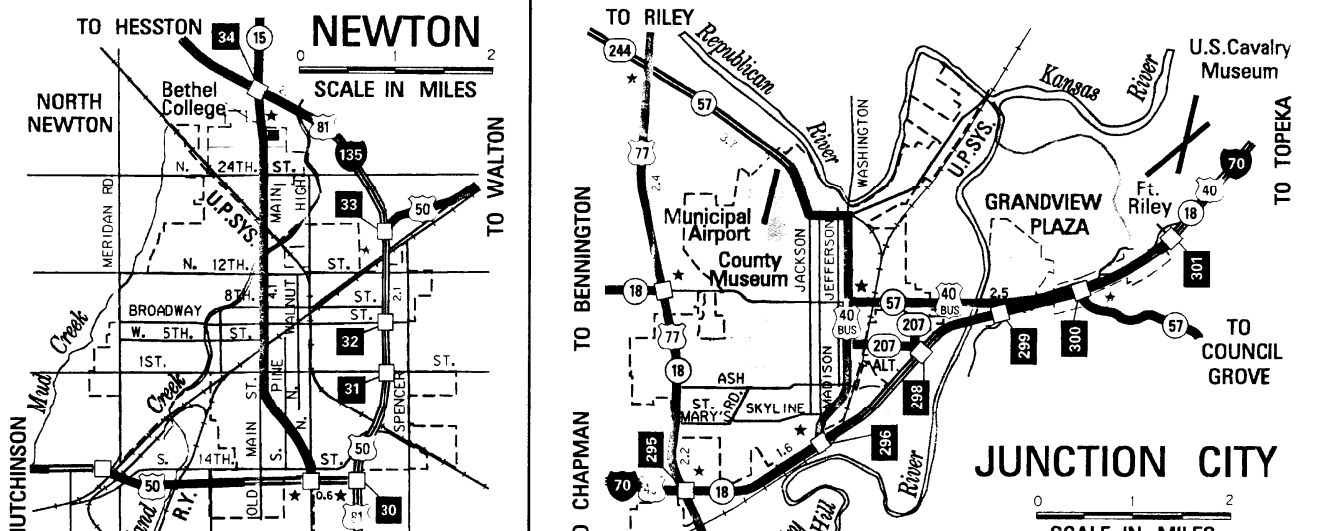
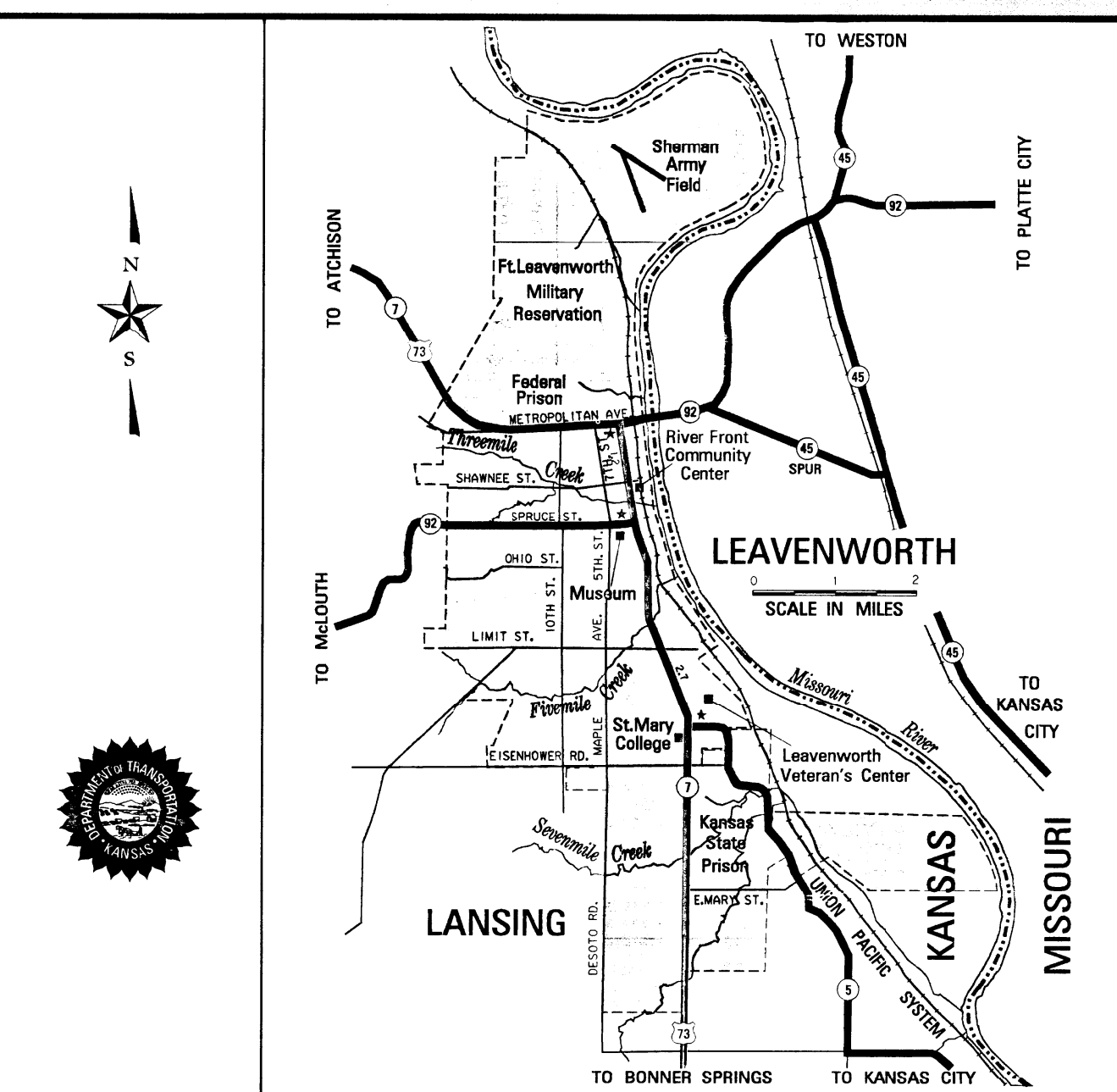
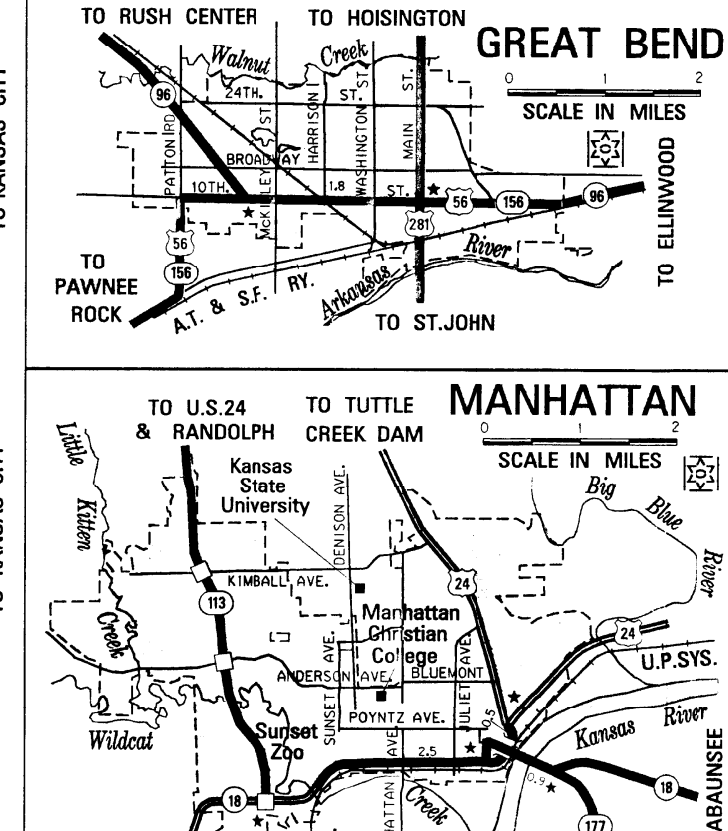
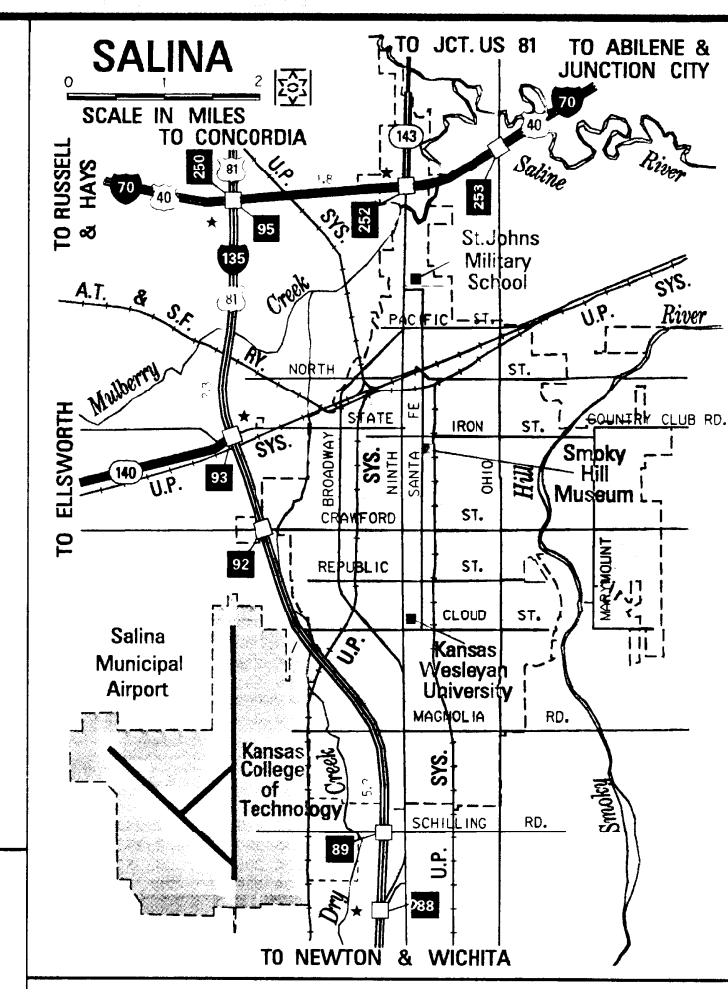
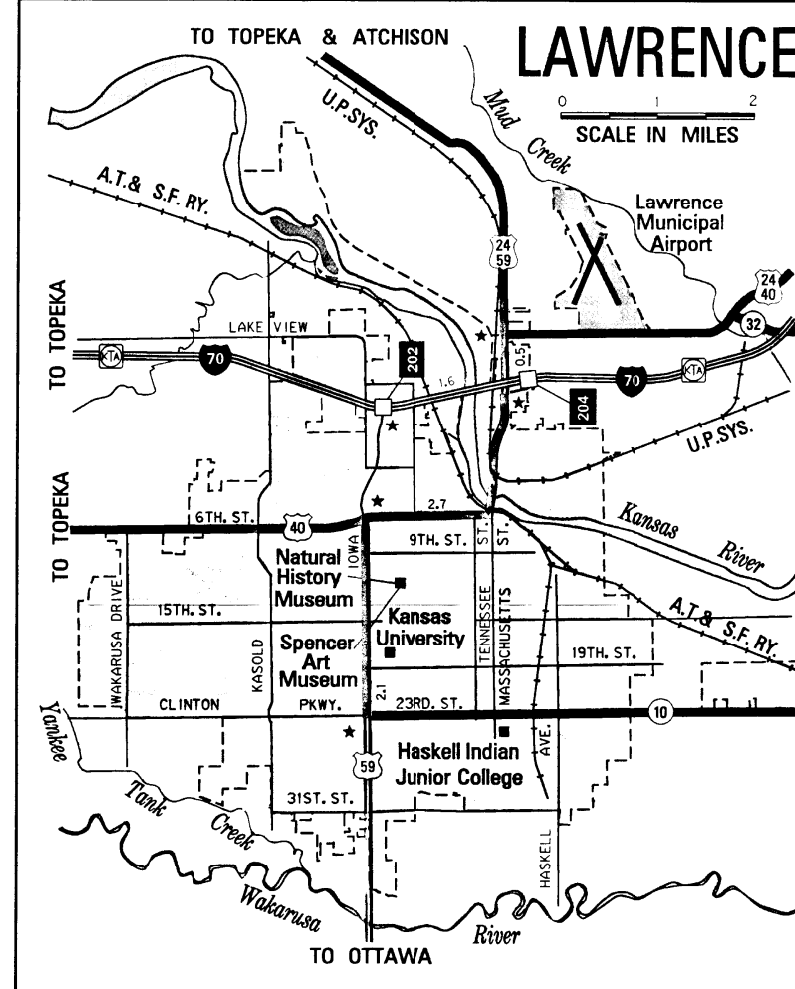
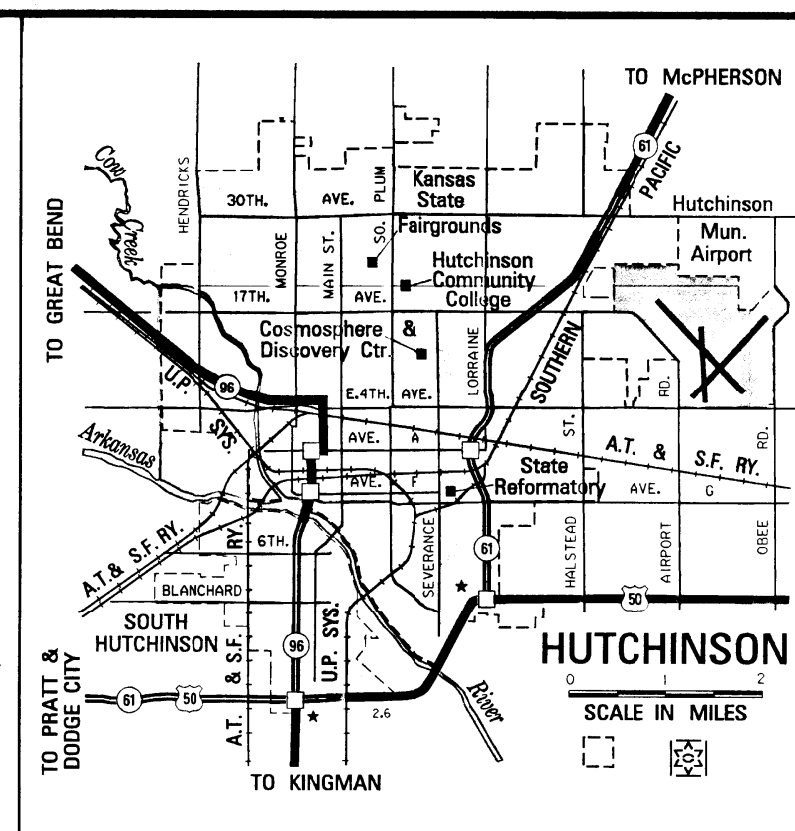
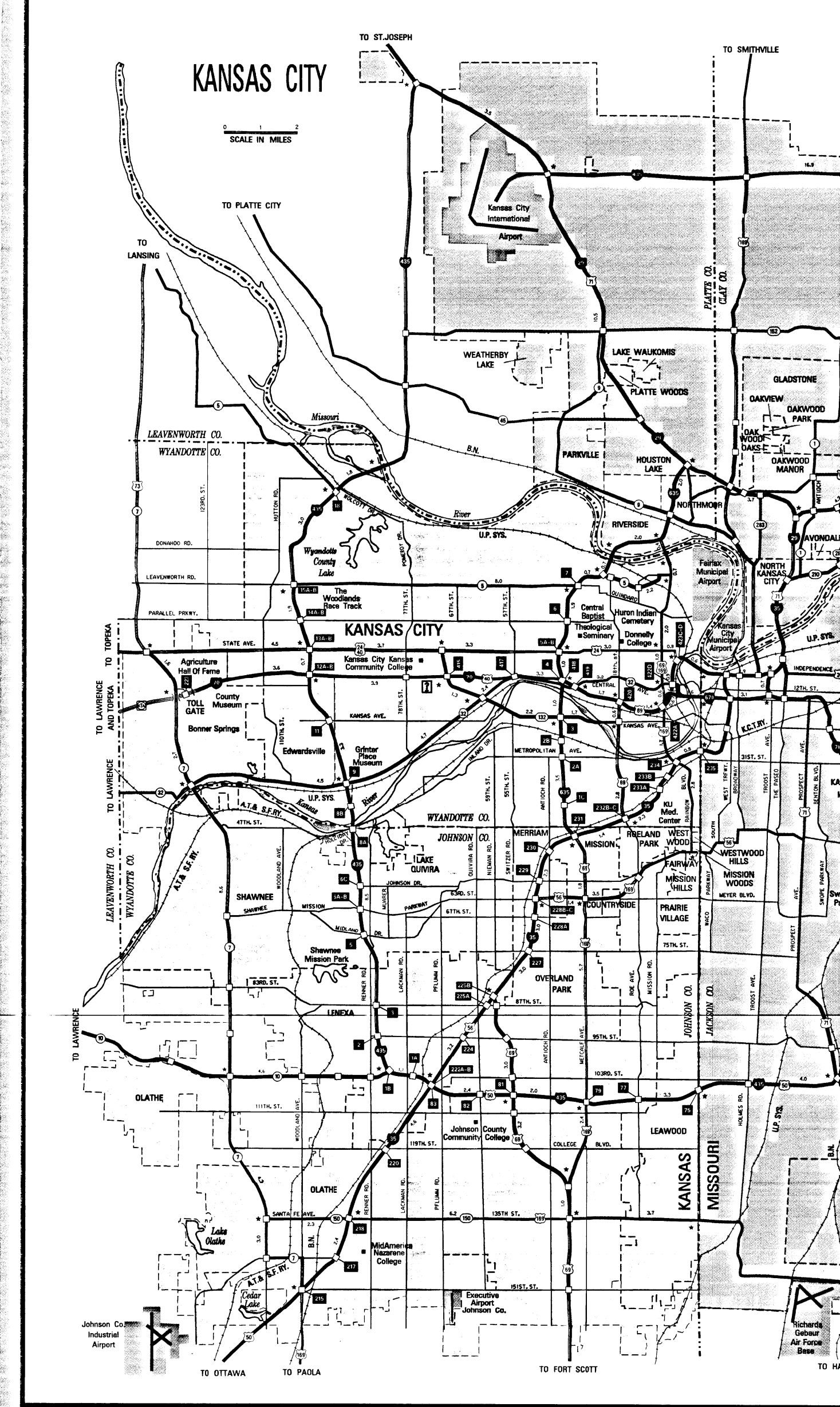
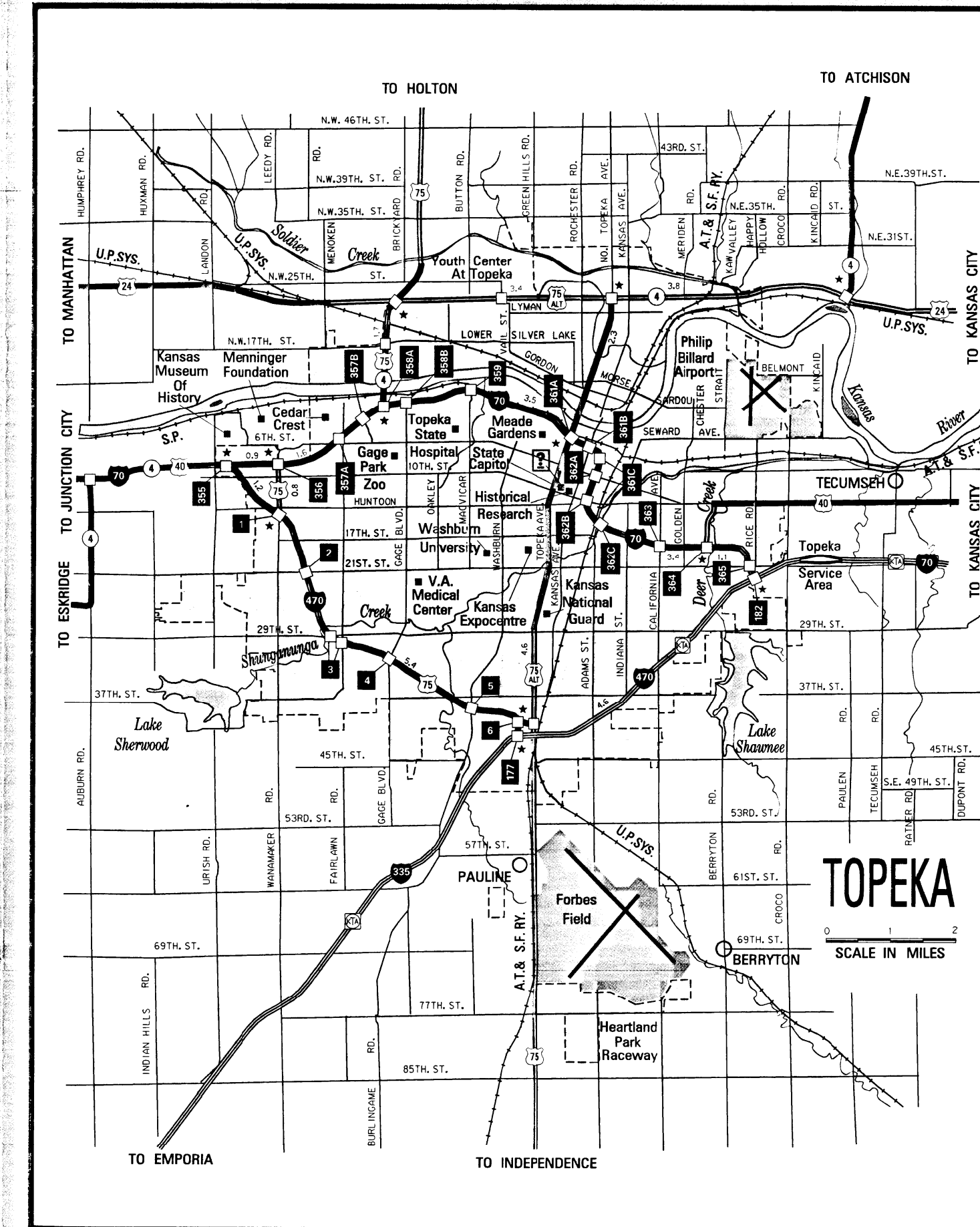
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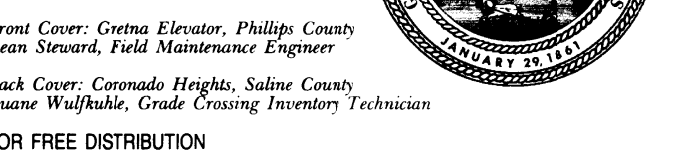
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Dear Kansas Traveler:
